Political Philosophy (Documents + Education + Experience = Constitution)

- I can explain the philosophical influences of the US Constitution.
- I can explain how three historical documents influenced the US Constitution (i.e. the Articles of Confederation, the English Bill of Rights, the Magna Carta, and the English Bill of Rights)
- I can explain how the framers experiences with government influenced the US Constitution.

Constitutional Principles

- Federalism
 - I can define federalism, explain why it is necessary, and explain how power is shared in American government (give examples).
- Checks and Balances
 - I can define checks and balances, explain why they are important, and give several examples in each branch of government.
- Separation of Powers
 - I can define separation of powers, explain why it is important, and give examples of how power is distributed in our federal government.

The Three Branches of Government

- I can list what groups/offices make up each branch.
- I can list and explain the major roles and powers of each branch.

Preamble

- I can use the Preamble to explain the purpose of the US Constitution.

Bill of Rights

- I can explain what the Bill of Rights is and explain its purpose.
- I can describe the freedoms guaranteed in the Bill of Rights (i.e. -- freedoms of expression, rights of the accused, reserved powers)
- I can use specific amendments in the Bill of Rights to make connections to my daily life.

Ratification

- I understand the history of the ratification of the Constitution.
- I understand how the Constitution can be changed and why the process is so difficult.
- I can contrast the Federalist and Anti-Federalist positions on the ratification of the Constitution (at least 3 examples for each).
